City of Cerritos COVID-19 update

Please note that the following information is current as of press time on September 18. For the most updated City information related to COVID-19, please visit cerritos.us.

The Cerritos Library now offers the public the ability to register for a new Cerritos Library card while the library is closed to the public. Instructions are posted on the library's website at cerritoslibrary.us. Applications can be submitted online, by mail or over the telephone. After receiving an application, library staff will schedule an appointment for the person to bring their required documents to a table outside the Library for review, and will then issue the new library card, if all the information is complete.

Extended tennis court hours are now available at Cerritos Park East, Liberty Park and Westgate Park, Mondays through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Los Angeles County is now allowing doubles play.

On September 2, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health issued a revised Health Officer Order allowing hair salons and barbershops to reopen for indoor services at 25 percent occupancy, provided they are in full compliance with the Health Officer's protocols. These protocols include physical distancing and the use of face coverings for both employees and customers, among other requirements. The order

encourages these businesses to continue outdoor operations when possible.

The revised order also allows for limited, on-campus operation for schools in L.A. County. Kindergarten through 12th grade schools are able to offer in-school services for small groups of students with Individualized Education Plans (IEP), students requiring instruction for English as a Second Language (ESL) or students needing assessments or specialized in-school services. The schools must be able to fully implement the Health Officer's guidance and protocols and submit an operational plan.

The City continues to carefully monitor State and County information about when and how City facilities will be allowed to reopen, and will provide updates as they become available. For a complete list of the status of City facilities, programs and events, please visit the City's website at cerritos.us.

As of press time, the County reported a total of 545 cases of COVID-19 in Cerritos and 15 deaths due to COVID-19. There were 17 reported cases of COVID-19 in the unincorporated area of Cerritos. The City's website has a link titled "Novel Coronavirus in Los Angeles County" that opens a page with information about the number of cases in cities throughout the County.

The City will continue to update residents and the community through its website, email blasts, Facebook

group, Cerritos TV3 and "The Cerritos News." To sign up to receive City email blasts, click the "E-News" red envelope link on the homepage of the City's website at cerritos.us.

Great Plates Delivered Program

The Great Plates Delivered program has been extended through Friday, October 9. This program provides three free home-delivered meals a day from local restaurants to qualifying older adults and adults over 60 who are at high-risk of COVID-19. CalMet rate adjustment approved

The Cerritos City Council has approved a proposed rate increase by CalMet Services, Inc. for solid waste collection and recycling services in the City.

Effective September 1, monthly residential rates went up 16 percent, bringing the new monthly cost to \$20.42. Commercial bin rates rose 13.7 percent, and the commercial roll-off dumpster rate increased 18 percent.

Despite the rate hikes, Cerritos maintains one of the lowest residential trash and recycling rates in Los Angeles County.

Under the terms of the City's 10-year solid waste management agreement with CalMet that was approved in 2017, CalMet is able to submit an annual request to adjust its rates each year. A request for a rate increase in 2018 was denied, and no rate increase request was considered in 2019. ■

Wildlife feeding prohibited in Cerritos

To protect the health and safety of the public and birds and animals, feeding wildlife is prohibited at Cerritos recreation facilities with areas of water.

Heritage Park experiences the highest number of patrons feeding wildlife. As a result, the increased accumulation of excrement and uneaten human foods at the bottom of the pond, walkways and surrounding areas of the park contribute to a continuous decline in the water quality of the moat.

Signs banning wildlife feeding are posted at all Cerritos recreation facilities with bodies of water. ■

City's Halloween Festival canceled

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the City's annual Halloween Festival has been canceled.

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health recommends that the public take part in this holiday in a manner that reduces the risk of spreading COVID-19.

Under the current Health Officer Order, Halloween gatherings, events or parties with non-household members are not permitted, even if they are conducted outdoors. Carnivals, festivals, live entertainment and haunted house attractions are not allowed.

Due to the difficulty of maintaining proper social distancing in the following instances, door-to-door trick-or-treating and "trunk or treating," which involves car-to-car candy dispersal, are not recommended.

Online parties, car parades that comply with public health guidance and decorating homes and yards with Halloween-themed decorations are allowed.

Regardless of how you choose to celebrate Halloween, it is important to keep in mind the following:

- Wear a cloth face covering when outside your home and around others who are not part of your household.
- Maintain social distancing of at least 6 feet between you and others who are not part of your household.
- Wash or sanitize your hands often.
- Clean frequently touched items regularly.
- If you are sick or have been in contact with someone who is sick with COVID-19 or has symptoms of COVID-19, stay home and away from others. ■

Veterans Day Ceremony canceled

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the City of Cerritos' annual Veterans Day Ceremony, originally scheduled for November 11, has been canceled.

The City's Veterans Project website at cerritosveterans.com recognizes those in the community who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces. Information about current or former Cerritos residents who have served in the United States Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marines or Navy is available on the website.

The City also honors veterans with the Cerritos Veterans Memorial displayed at the Civic Center. Designed by James T. Russell, the artwork consists of a polished stainless steel sculpture rising from a 20-foot circular black granite reflecting pool surrounded by five podiums. The podiums are emblazoned with a three-dimensional gold star on the front façade, with the military seal from each branch of the United States Armed Forces placed at the top of the podiums. Plaques on the memorial honor the U.S. Merchant Marine and special groups recognized by the U.S. Congress for their service and support of the U.S. Armed Forces during World War I and II. The memorial is also inscribed in memory of Lieutenant Colonel Mario Carazo, a resident of Cerritos who was killed while flying a combat mission over Helmand province in Afghanistan. ■

- Waived full reading and adopted Ordinance No. 1033, an ordinance of the City of Cerritos repealing Chapter 2.22 of the Cerritos Municipal Code, thereby dissolving the City of Cerritos Economic Development Commission; and
- Waived full reading and adopted Resolution No. 2020-17, a resolution of the City Council of the City of Cerritos repealing Resolution 2004-10 related to organization, membership and duties of the Economic Development Commission.
- Awarded a contract in the amount of \$867,000 for 166th Street Rehabilitation (total bid), Federal Project No. STPL-5325 (018), Project No. 13065, Bid No. 1402-20, to Onyx Paving Company, Inc., and rejected the other bids; and
- Authorized the City Manager or his designee to execute any project-related change orders.
- Awarded a professional services contract in the amount of \$83,750 for construction management and inspection services, Project No. 13065, Federal Project No. STPL-5325 (018), RFP No. 1401-20, to PPM Group, Inc., and rejected the other proposals; and
- Authorized the City Manager or his designee to execute any contract modifications that may be necessary to complete the specified scope of work.
- Directed the City Manager's staff to prepare letters of City opposition to pending legislation related to housing as a matter of protecting local control, specifically: AB 1279 (Bloom), AB 1484 (Grayson), AB 2345 (Gonzalez), AB 3107 (Bloom), SB 899 (Wiener), SB 1085 (Skinner), SB 1120 (Atkins) and SB 1385 (Caballero) and to send the letters to

the respective authors of the specific legislation and policy committees, with copies to Senator Archuleta, Assemblymember Cristina Garcia and the professional organizations of which the City of Cerritos is a member.

August 3, 2020

- Approved the recommendation of a proposed resolution for transmittal to the League of California Cities for potential consideration by the League's General Assembly at its 2020 League of California Cities Annual Business Meeting to be held as part of its 2020 Annual Conference, October 7-9, 2020. The proposed resolution is captioned as follows: A resolution of the General Assembly of the League of California Cities calling for an amendment of Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act of 1996 to require social media companies to remove materials which promote criminal activities.

August 13, 2020

- Mayor Naresh Solanki established an ad hoc West Santa Ana Branch Rail committee, led by Councilmember Bruce Barrows, with Mayor Solanki serving as alternate.
- Mayor Naresh Solanki nominated Mayor Pro Tem Chuong Vo to serve as the City's appointed delegate to the California Joint Powers Insurance Authority (CJPIA), replacing Councilmember Bruce Barrows.
- Authorized the Mayor to execute the Transfer Agreement between the Los Angeles County Flood Control District and the City of Cerritos (Agreement No. 2020MP15 Safe, Clean Water Program – Municipal Program), which expires at the end of the 2023-24 Fiscal Year, to obtain an estimated \$970,000 in annual local return of Measure W funds; and
- Authorized the City Manager or his designee to execute the required Annual Plans and Annual Progress/Expenditure Reports consistent with the City's adopted financial programs.

- Authorized the Mayor to execute the second amendment to the Memorandum of Understanding between the Gateway Region Integrated Water Management Joint Powers Authority and the member cities of the Los Cerritos Channel Watershed Management Group on behalf of the City of Cerritos; and
- Authorized the Mayor to execute the second amendment to the Memorandum of Understanding between the Gateway Region Integrated Water Management Joint Powers Authority and the member cities of the Lower San Gabriel River Watershed Management Group on behalf of the City of Cerritos.
- Approved the second amendment to Agreement No. 34368 for a two-year extension to the contract between the City of Cerritos and the City of Long Beach Animal Care Services for the provision of animal control and sheltering services for the period of July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2022; and
- Authorized the City Manager to sign all necessary documentation on behalf of the City of Cerritos.
- Waived further reading of and adopted Resolution No. 2020-18, a resolution of the City Council of the City of Cerritos approving the submission of an attestation of the veracity of the power source disclosure annual report to the California Energy Commission.
- Directed the City Manager to provide a report that shows the correlation between the increases in City animal licensing fees and increases in the contract costs over the past 20 years as related to the City's agreement with the City of Long Beach Animal Care Services for the provision of animal control and sheltering services.
- Directed the City Manager to provide the pine tree removal and reforestation program agenda report at the same meeting at which the second quarter City sales tax revenue/budget/audit agenda report will be presented (in October 2020).

Apps offered by City of Cerritos

The City of Cerritos offers various apps to make life easier for residents.

GoRequest: Available for iPhones and Android phones, the app allows residents to make service requests. Download the app from the Android Market/Google Play or iPhone App Store by searching for "GoRequest." Residents can report issues in the following categories: graffiti; trees – trim, roots or inspection; pothole or street issue; sidewalk or gutter; streetlight, street sign or traffic signal; debris or trash; weeds or overgrown vegetation; animal issue; code enforcement; water issue; or other.

The app uses the phone's GIS information to record the location of the service request. Photos of the area can be attached to the service request. Once an issue is reported through the app, City staff will track it and send status reports to the resident. For more information, call the City's Public Works Department at (562) 916-1220.

Cerritos Library To Go: This app offers a tour of the library and access to the eCatalog, event calendar and the library's YouTube videos. The app's BookLook Mobile™ feature allows users to scan or enter a book's ISBN barcode data to see if the book is in the library's collection. With the app's Smart Prefix™ search, parts of words (such as "har pot ch" when looking for "Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets") can be entered to easily search the eCatalog. Make your home earthquake-ready

Californians live in earthquake country and while tremors can strike at any time without warning, there are ways to make your home safer.

- **Strap down heavy objects:** Secure television sets, computers and stereos. Use buckles and safety straps to keep oversized objects from moving during the shaking.
- **Anchor and brace:** Tall items (such as bookcases, entertainment consoles, file cabinets, dressers and large appliances like refrigerators) can tip over. Use flexible fasteners to anchor them to the studs in the wall. Use a metal bracing kit to strap the water heater to wall studs. Use a brace that is secured to the ceiling joist for ceiling fans, chandeliers and light fixtures to keep them from falling in a quake.
- **Install child safety latches:** Cabinet doors and drawers can swing vigorously during intense shaking, causing injuries and destruction. Installing latches on cabinet doors and drawers prevents contents like glasses and dishes from flying out and causing injuries and damage.
- **Hire an inspector:** If your home was built before 1992, when more earthquake-resistance standards were introduced, hire a professional to inspect your home. Even homes constructed after 1992 should be checked to ensure that structural integrity is maintained.
- **Rearrange furniture:** Position beds near interior walls and away from windows. Store heavy items on low shelves to prevent them from falling during a tremor and causing injuries or property damage. Don't hang heavy items (such as mirrors, plants and framed artwork and pictures) above beds, couches,

chairs or in places where people are likely to be sitting or sleeping. Use closed hooks or adhesive tabs to hang pictures, art or mirrors on walls.

- **Secure knickknacks:** Quickly, safely and affordably secure decorative items with adhesives such as putty and Velcro.
- **Store hazardous chemicals properly:** Hazardous household chemicals (bleach, gasoline and fertilizer) should be stored far away from furnaces and stoves so they can't tip over and catch fire during a quake.
- **Clear a path:** Keep all forms of exits clear and easily accessible.
- **Add flexible connections:** Make sure appliances have flexible gas or electrical connections so they won't break and cause other hazards like gas leakage or fires during an earthquake. Know how to turn off your utilities, including gas, water and electricity.
- **Check the chimney:** Have your chimney inspected by a licensed civil engineer for stability and safety – especially in homes built before 1960.
- **Assess the foundation:** Have a licensed civil engineer ensure that your home is bolted to the foundation; this is particularly important if your home was built before 1935. If your home is built on a raised foundation, make sure that it has shear plywood walls in the crawlspace, rather than the older-style cripple walls.
- **Consider insurance:** Consider buying earthquake insurance since most homeowner's policies do not cover earthquake damage. ■

Free bulky item and electronic waste pickup available for residents

The City's trash hauler, CalMet Services, Inc., offers free bulky item and electronic waste pickups.

Bulky items are large items that will not fit into the trash and recycling containers. These include household appliances, mattresses, furniture and miscellaneous bulky items such as metal pipes, wood and carpet. Miscellaneous bulky items must be cut to 4 feet in length and bundled with string, and may not exceed a weight of 50 pounds. Pickup is also available for additional bagged or bundled waste and green waste that will not fit into the trash or recycling containers.

Electronic waste, such as computers, monitors, televisions and cell phones, can also be scheduled for curbside pickup. Cell phones should be placed in a box on the curb.

To schedule a bulky item or electronic waste pickup, call CalMet's Customer Services Department at (562) 259-1239 at least 24 hours prior to your

regular trash service day. Specify what types of items are to be removed. CalMet requests that each bulky item or electronic waste pickup not exceed five items. Residents who schedule a bulky item or electronic waste pickup should place the items at the curb no earlier than sunset the night prior to the regular trash collection day and no later than 7 a.m. on the morning of the scheduled pickup.

Items not eligible for bulky item pickup include construction material, tires, car and boat parts and other hazardous waste. Hazardous waste can be dropped off at a household hazardous waste roundup. To find an upcoming household hazardous roundup event, call (888) CLEAN-LA or visit cleanla.com.

Before scheduling a bulky-item or electronic waste pickup, consider donating usable goods to charity. Call Goodwill Industries at (800) GOODWILL or the Salvation Army at (800) 95-TRUCK to donate items. ■

City ordinance regulates use of leaf blowers

Under City ordinance, the use of gas-operated leaf blowers in any residential area and in commercial areas within 400 feet of any residential area in the City is restricted to the hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays and legal holidays. The City ordinance regulating these hours was designed to protect residents from excessive noise caused by such equipment.

Leaf blowers should not direct debris onto adjacent parcels or lots. Such debris should be removed and disposed of properly to prevent dispersion by wind or other similar means. Piles of leaves left in the gutters can clog storm drains and cause flooding. In addition, leaves in storm drains decompose and grow bacteria that can travel into the ocean. ■

Prevent vehicle burglaries

Vehicle burglaries have increased considerably in Los Angeles and Orange counties. According to Cerritos Sheriff's Station deputies, items left in plain view – including laptops, cell phones, garage door openers, purses, briefcases, wallets and gym bags – are some of the most frequently stolen items.

The best security against vehicle burglars is to avoid storing items in the car. If you do, secure or conceal the items. Always lock car doors and report the license plates or descriptions of suspicious vehicles or persons immediately to the Cerritos Sheriff's Station.

Cerritos on Wheels (COW): The free app allows passengers to check the location of COW buses in real-time and the arrival time of buses in service at any point along the route. It can be downloaded from the City's website at cerritotransit.com or from Apple's App store or the Android Market/Google Play. City extends contract with Long Beach for animal care services

The Cerritos City Council has approved a two-year extension of its contract with the City of Long Beach for animal care services. The contract is effective July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2022.

The cost for the fiscal year 2020-2021 is \$359,406. The cost for the second year will be adjusted accordingly based on the Consumer Price Index.

Since 1989, Cerritos has contracted with Long Beach Animal Care Services for animal care. Over the years, Long Beach Animal Care Services has enhanced services and improved response times to service calls. Residents are now able to renew licenses online, and a full-time State-licensed veterinarian has been hired.
