Community input sought on City website redesign

Earlier this year, the Cerritos City Council approved a redesign of the City's websites. GHD Services Inc. was awarded a contract for website design and hosting of the main City, Safer Cerritos, Cerritos Library, Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts and Shop Cerritos sites.

The City is seeking community input on the redesign of the main City website, and will make available on online survey for community members to provide feedback. The survey will be open Thursday, September 1 through Sunday, September 11 at 5 p.m. Participants will only be allowed to complete the survey once.

A link to the survey will be posted on the City's website at cerritos.us and on the City's Facebook group starting Thursday, September 1.

City enters agreement to purchase solar energy

The City of Cerritos has entered into a Power Sales Agreement with Southern California Public Power Authority (SCPPA) for the purchase of 5 megawatts (MW) of green solar energy and 3 MW of battery storage capacity for a projected annual cost of \$737,000 over a 20-year term.

The projected savings that Cerritos Electric Utility (CEU) will experience is roughly \$303,000 per year. Procuring energy through the SCPPA will align the CEU closer with the State of California's Renewable Portfolio Standard Regulations and move the CEU closer to meeting Resource Adequacy Regulations, which were established to ensure that utilities possess adequate generation capacity to serve their customers during periods of peak demand, thereby reducing potential outages.

City adopts resolution implementing emergency water conservation regulations

The Cerritos City Council recently adopted a resolution outlining emergency water conservation regulations that are now in effect in Cerritos. The

- Using water to clean, fill or maintain levels in decorative fountains unless a recycling system is used;
- Serving drinking water to any customer in a res-

projects and properties using reclaimed water are exempt from this provision. Watering using a handheld container, a hose equipped with a shut off nozzle or the use of an irrigation system for short durations to make repairs are also exempt from the provision. In accordance with State regulations, drip irrigation systems and other similar low-water irrigation systems are exempt from limitations on watering duration. Violation of the regulations is an infraction punishable by a fine of up to \$500 per day. The emergency regulations will remain in effect until the State-mandated restrictions expire, at which time the City Council will review the water supply conditions to determine the need for continued mandatory conservation measures.

regulations enacted are in response to the State Water Resources Control Board's adoption of emergency water conservation regulations in June.

Except when necessary to address an immediate health and safety need or to comply with a term or condition in a permit issued by a state or federal agency, the following actions are prohibited:

- Washing of walkways, driveways or parking areas with a hose;
- Allowing a hose to run continuously while washing vehicles;
- Allowing sprinklers to direct water to areas other than landscape, causing runoff;

taurant or other public place where food is served, sold or offered for sale unless expressly requested by the customer; and

• Failing to repair all water leaks as soon as possible. Residential and commercial landscape areas shall be watered solely between the hours of 4 p.m. and 10 a.m. and for no more than 10 minutes. Watering shall be limited to three times per week during the months of June through September, and two times per week during the months of October through May. Landscape irrigation for commercial nurseries and growers, fire and erosion protection, the protection of endangered species, environmental mitigation

Medication drop-off kiosk available at Cerritos Sheriff's Station

The City of Cerritos, in cooperation with the Cerritos Sheriff's Station and MED-Project, have made available a medication drop-off program for the community. The program provides an opportunity for the public to safely and anonymously surrender

over-the-counter medications, unused or expired prescriptions and illegal/controlled substances. The kiosk is not a depository for hypodermic needles or syringes. Medications can be placed in the blue kiosk located in the Cerritos Sheriff's Station lobby, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Items should be brought in a closed container or plastic bag. No questions will be asked.

Following are additional water conservation tips:

- Refer to drought-tolerant plant guidelines recommended by the City. A brochure is available in the Community Development Department, and information is also online at cerritos.us.
- Run only full loads in clothes washers and dishwashers.
- Avoid flushing toilets unnecessarily; dispose of tissues, insects and other similar waste in the trash instead.
- Don't leave the water running when washing dishes, brushing your teeth or shaving.
- Wash your produce in the sink or a pan that is partially filled with water instead of running water from the tap.

water conservation regulations

- Store drinking water in the refrigerator rather than letting the tap run to get a cold glass of water.
- For fish owners, when you clean your fish tank, use the water you've drained on your plants. The water is rich in nitrogen and phosphorus, providing you with a free and effective fertilizer.

Committed to the preservation of the environment and conservation of water, the City of Cerritos has taken steps to conserve natural resources through a recycled-water distribution system. Cerritos irrigates more than 200 acres of City-owned property - including most parks, parkways, decorative fountains and medians – with recycled water.

The use of recycled water saves about 722 million gallons of potable drinking water annually and is billed monthly at about half the cost of drinking water. In addition to being used on City-owned property, the recycled water is used to irrigate schools, a county park, a City of Lakewood park, cemeteries, freeway landscaping and some privately owned landscaped areas. Originating from industries, businesses and homes, the waste water is treated by a three-stage process by the Sanitation District facility located in Cerritos before being used for irrigation. Broadband fiber optic plan study approved

A feasibility study and cost benefit analysis for a citywide broadband fiber optic master plan has been approved by the Cerritos City Council for economic development, workforce investment and revenue generating purposes.

The Government Technology Group (GTG) will be paid \$74,685 to prepare the study. GTG will analyze asset inventory, technology and trends, broadband availability and market analysis, needs and goals assessments, broadband gap analysis, conceptual broadband design, business model and financial analyses, phased implementation planning and grants and funding opportunities.

To offset the cost of the study and cost-benefit analysis, the City will pursue funding, including from the Local Agency Technology Assistance program established by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), which provides potential grant amounts up to \$500,000 for each eligible local agency for expenses associated with technical assistance projects facilitating last-mile broadband infrastructure.

Active Shooter seminar to be held September 24

The City of Cerritos will host an Active Shooter/ Trauma Wound Care seminar on Saturday, September 24 from 10 to 11:30 a.m. in the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts Sierra Room.

All community members are invited to attend. The informational seminar will be presented by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Special Enforcement Bureau (SWAT & Tactical Paramedics). Sponsored by the Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts, the event provides Los Angeles County residents with the opportunity to legally dispose of unwanted household items that cannot be discarded in the regular trash.

Items that will be accepted include motor oil, antifreeze, paint, paint thinner, turpentine, cleaners with acids or lye, pesticides and herbicides, household and car batteries, old computers and televisions, used needles, expired pharmaceuticals and mercury thermometers.

Things that will not be accepted are explosives, ammunition or radioactive materials; trash or old tires; waste from businesses; and appliances such as washers, stoves, refrigerators and air conditioners.

Bring items in sturdy boxes, preferably in their original labeled containers, and do not mix the products together. Be prepared to leave your containers. There is a limit of 15 gallons or 125 pounds per vehicle.

City of Cerritos COVID-19 update

Please note that the following information is current as of August 16.

At press time, the County was reporting a total of 11,311 cases of COVID-19 in Cerritos and 88 deaths due to COVID-19. There were 167 reported cases of COVID-19 and two deaths in the unincorporated area of Cerritos. This represents an increase of 913 cases and one death in Cerritos since the August issue of "The Cerritos News."

New 988 hotline helps those in mental health crisis

A new federal number 988, which recently debuted in California and across the country, was created specifically for people struggling with mental-health emergencies.

Touted as an alternative to 911, supporters of the 988 hotline say the shortcut is a faster route for those wrestling with mental crises, easily connecting them to the State's network of 13 National Suicide Prevention Lifeline call centers. 988 counselors are expected to address an estimated 6 to 12 million calls and texts throughout the next year.

Los Angeles County hopes to eventually integrate 911 and 988, allowing dispatchers from both hotlines to be on the line to offer callers the appropriate response and assistance.
