### CCPA kicks off 2023-2024 Season



The Temptations performs with The Four Tops on Sunday, September 10 at the CCPA.

The Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts (CCPA) kicks off the 2023-2024 Season in September with a dazzling lineup.

Celebrating his 67th year in the music industry, legend Johnny Mathis brings "The Voice of Romance Tour" to the CCPA stage on Saturday, September 9 at 8 p.m. The Grammy Hall of Famer performs his greatest hits, including "Chances Are," "It's Not for Me to Say," "Misty" and more. Widely celebrated for his romantic ballads and festive holiday music, Mathis, who was also honored with the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences, is noted by the "Los Angeles Times" for his "distinctive vocal tone, with its telltale quaver." Tickets prices start at \$89.

Motown masters The Temptations and The Four Tops perform in Cerritos on Sunday, September 10 at 7 p.m. The Temptations set the bar for Soul and R&B

groups with a litany of hits, including "The Way You Do the Things You Do," which propelled the band into international fame. The group's singles "My Girl" and "Papa Was a Rolling Stone" were inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame. The Four Tops rocked the Pop and R&B charts with the hits "I Can't Help Myself (Sugar Pie, Honey Bunch)," "Ain't No Woman (Like the One I've Got)" and "Reach Out I'll Be There," which became the group's signature song. Tickets to the show start at \$69.

Enjoy the Dire Straits Legacy Tour 2023 on Sunday, September 17 at 7 p.m. This "Director's Pick" show honors one of the most original Rock bands of the '80s: the British Group Dire Straits, known for its bluesy, guitar-driven sound. Group members Alan Clark, Phil Palmer, Danny Cummings, Mel Collins and Jack Sonni celebrate the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame band's music, which includes the notable albums "Making Movies," "Love Over Gold" and "Brothers in Arms," showcasing the hit singles "Money for Nothing" and "Walk of Life." # City premieres Cerritos Auto Square documentary

The City of Cerritos, in partnership with the Cerritos Auto Square, is pleased to present a new documentary video "Nothing Like It In the World — The Story of the Cerritos Auto Square." The video details the creation, challenges and achievements of the auto mall, including the unique partnership between the City and auto dealers that has contributed to the Auto Square's success.

The Cerritos Auto Square is the world's first and largest auto mall, boasting an unequaled location,

### CCPA to undergo safety upgrades

The City Council recently awarded a \$333,225 contract to AeroGo to conduct movement system and air caster safety upgrades at the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts (CCPA).

With a unique movement system, the CCPA's main theater has six different configurations that offer significant adjustments to the theater's physical shape, acoustics, stage location and seating arrangements.

A key element of the CCPA's innovative movement system is a network of air casters, under many of the building components, that use air pressure to raise and float several sections of seating platforms and seven large structures known as seating towers.

The five largest seating towers are physically connected to the building structure and rely on semi-automated controls to operate their air casters and motorized drive systems. The two smallest seating

towers — the Pro Towers — are four-story structures, each weighing approximately 65,000 pounds.

These two Pro Towers require staff interaction to manually control the air casters and physically push the structures without mechanical advantage.

The air caster system was originally designed and installed by AeroGo, which specializes in heavy-load moving technology. In business since 1967, the company has been the sole source supplier of air casters for the CCPA since the venue was constructed. AeroGo will design and install an Automatic Height Control System (AHCS) to work with the CCPA's existing air caster network. The improvement will not only enhance overall safety, but also eliminate the need for manual adjustments, thus reducing significant labor hours and expenses over the life of the movement system.

The work is expected to conclude in December.

### City facilities observe Labor Day

Cerritos City Hall, the City Clerk/Treasurer's Office, Cerritos Library, the Cerritos Senior Center at Pat Nixon Park, the Community Gymnasiums at Cerritos and Whitney high schools and the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts Ticket Office will be closed on Monday, September 4 in observance of Labor Day.

Cerritos Park East, Heritage Park and Liberty Park will be open from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. and the Cerritos Sports Complex will be open from 2 to 8 p.m. The Cerritos Iron-Wood Nine Golf Course driving range will be open from 6:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. The Cerritos Olympic Swim and Fitness Center will be open from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m.

There will be no street sweeping and trash pick-up on Labor Day. Schedules will be delayed by one day for the remainder of the week through Saturday. The COW and Dial-A-Ride transit services will not operate on Labor Day.

### Del Amo Boulevard Bridge Replacement Project study begins

The City of Cerritos is the lead agency on a multiyear design of the Del Amo Boulevard Bridge Replacement and Traffic Signal Enhancement Project. Through a collaborative effort between the cities of Cerritos, Lakewood, La Palma and Cypress, this project aims to fully replace the Del Amo Boulevard Bridge at Coyote Creek and optimize traffic along Del Amo Boulevard from the easterly City limits at Denni Street to the I-605 freeway.

### Cerritos Council Chambers upgrade completed

An upgrade of the Cerritos Council Chambers has been completed, providing a state-of-the-art experience for those attending meetings in-person, streaming online or watching on cable television.

New audio/video equipment was installed, including ultra-high definition cameras and screens, speakers, touchscreen displays, digital nameplates, LED lighting and microphones. Signal distribution, broadcast and control systems were improved. The renovated Council Chambers also features agenda management software with voting integration, as well as a digital public comment sign-in system.

New carpet and seat upholstery were put in, as was an expanded hearing loop system providing coverage to every seat location in the Council Chambers. The lighting and audio/video technology in the conference room and lobby also were enhanced.

The upgrades were completed by Western Audio Visual in Orange in collaboration with City staff and on-call maintenance contractors. City meetings have resumed in the Council Chambers.

# Contracts approved for tree and concrete upgrades

The Cerritos City Council recently awarded contracts for tree upgrades and concrete improvements in the residential neighborhood bordered by 183rd Street, Palo Verde Avenue, Destino Circle and San Gabriel Avenue. Funding is provided through the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account created by Senate Bill 1.

The tree phase of the project is expected to take place in mid-September. Golden West Arbor Services of Pomona was awarded a \$115,400 contract to remove 76 parkway trees, including stump grinding and stump removal, and plant 64 trees in existing parkways.

Once the tree phase of the project is completed, CJ Concrete Construction, Inc. of Santa Fe Springs will begin the concrete work. The company was awarded a \$674,000 contract to perform the concrete repairs.

Residents are responsible for watering the tree in the parkway in front of their house. The City's Tree Division will place a notice on each resident's door when a tree is planted, with guidelines for care and maintenance of new trees.

### Metropolitan Water District offers conservation rebate program

Residential and commercial rebates are available for qualifying water-saving devices and measures through the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) conservation rebate program.

Products eligible for rebates include highefficiency clothes washers, premium high-efficiency toilets, weather-based irrigation controllers, rotating sprinkler nozzles, rain barrels and cisterns and soil moisture sensor systems. Turf removal also qualifies for rebates.

Rebate amounts may vary and are based on the availability of funding. Visit socalwatersmart.com or call (888) 376-3314 for more information.

# Tips to help seniors beat the heat

The heat of the summer months can lead to heat stroke, sun poisoning, dehydration and other heat-related illnesses. People age 65 years or older are especially prone to heat-related health problems. They are more likely to have a chronic medical condition that changes normal body responses to heat. They are also more likely to take prescription medicines that affect the body's ability to control its temperature or sweat.

Seniors and their caretakers should heed the following tips:

- Stay in air-conditioned buildings as much as possible. Do not rely on the fan as a main cooling source when it's exceptionally hot outside.
- Drink more water than usual; don't wait until you're thirsty to drink.
- Do not use the oven or stove to cook as they will make the house hotter.
- Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.
- Take cool showers or baths to cool down.
- Do not engage in strenuous activities, and get plenty of rest.
- Check on a friend or neighbor and have someone do the same for you.
- Seek immediate medical care if you or someone you know has symptoms of heat-related illness, such as muscle cramps, headaches, nausea or vomiting.

# Homeowners' Exemption program provides property tax savings

The Los Angeles County Assessor's Office Homeowners' Exemption (HOX) program reduces the assessed value of a home or condo by \$7,000 for tax purposes, which translates to a reduction of \$70 annually to a homeowner's property tax bill.

The property must be the owner's principal place of residence as of January 1, and an application must be submitted in order for a homeowner to qualify. An application received after February 15 is prorated for that year, but the homeowner will receive the full amount the following years. The savings will continue until a change is recorded.

A trained crisis worker answers the phone, listens to the callers, provides support, and gets callers the help that they need.  $\blacksquare$ 

# City ordinance regulates use of leaf blowers

Under City ordinance, the use of gas-operated leaf blowers in any residential area and in commercial areas within 400 feet of any residential area in the City is restricted to the hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays and legal holidays. The City ordinance regulating these hours was designed to protect residents from excessive noise caused by such equipment.

Leaf blowers should not direct debris onto adjacent parcels or lots. Such debris should be removed and disposed of properly to prevent dispersion by wind or other similar means. Piles of leaves left in the gutters can clog storm drains and cause flooding. In addition, leaves in storm drains decompose and grow bacteria that can travel into the ocean.

# Short-term rentals banned in Cerritos

Cerritos residential property owners are reminded that the City of Cerritos prohibits short-term rentals.

Short-term rentals refer to leasing or renting a single-family residential dwelling unit (in whole or in part) for 31 days or fewer. The most common types of short-term rentals are vacation rentals and home-sharing rentals, which are both prohibited. The Sheraton Cerritos Hotel located in the commercially zoned Cerritos Towne Center is not considered a short-term rental under the ordinance.

The ban strives to protect Cerritos residential neighborhoods from the noise, nuisances, added traffic and other adverse factors that can arise with short-term rentals. Appropriate enforcement measures will be taken against those who violate the City ordinance.

### Follow traffic safety tips as children return to school

Thousands of local children returned to school in August. The following school safety tips are provided by the National Safe Routes to School Program and the City of Cerritos Community Safety Division.

- Slow down and obey all traffic laws and speed limits. This may be the most important safety tip to observe around schools.
- Comply with school drop-off and pick-up procedures. Many schools in Cerritos have student valet or parking lot transition programs and should be used if possible.
- Avoid double parking and stopping in crosswalks or in people's driveways to let children out of the car.
   Do not allow children to cross the street mid-block, and teach them to use crosswalks. Cerritos Sheriff's deputies have been directed to issue citations for these violations.
- Stop for a school bus when red overhead lights are flashing or a stop sign has been activated on the street side of the bus. Violating this law may result in a very expensive citation.
- Watch for children crossing streets near schools or at nearby corners. Pedestrians have the rightof-way when in marked or unmarked crosswalks. (Any intersection has an unmarked crosswalk unless a posted sign says otherwise.)
- Watch for children on sidewalks when backing out or entering a driveway.
- Pay attention to the directions of crossing guards, and take the time to thank them occasionally.
   These guards put themselves at risk every day to protect the kids.

### Join Neighborhood Watch

Residents are encouraged to join the Neighborhood Watch in Cerritos, a joint effort by community members and the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety Center to fight crime and protect property. One of the oldest crime-prevention programs, it serves as the eyes and ears of the Sheriff's Department and has proven instrumental in keeping communities safe.

Contact the Community Safety Division at (562) 916-1266 to see if a Neighborhood Watch group has been formed in your neighborhood. If there is an established group, you will be provided with the name and phone number of the Watch Captain.

If there is no active group yet in your area, the Community Safety Division will help you and your neighbors start one. Ideal Neighborhood Watch groups are typically small — usually 15 to 20 households — to simplify communication among participants. A designated block captain will be responsible for acting as the liaison between a neighborhood and the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety

While the Community Safety Division and Sheriff's Department will assist in many ways, the success of Neighborhood Watch depends largely on citizen involvement. Participants will receive Neighborhood Watch signs to post, alerting potential criminals that others are watching out for your home. Members of the watch group monitor their neighborhoods, communicate regularly with deputies and meet with neighbors routinely to stay current on new information. If a residential crime pattern is identified in the area, deputies will notify the group of what to look out for and suggest prevention strategies.

# Apps offered by City of Cerritos

The City of Cerritos offers various apps to make life easier for residents.

Request Cerritos: Available for iPhones and Android phones, this app allows residents to make service requests. Upgrade the former GoRequest app or download the new app from the Android Market/ Google Play or iPhone App Store by searching for "Request Cerritos." Residents can report issues regarding graffiti; trees – trim, roots or inspection; pothole or street issue; sidewalk or gutter; streetlight, street sign or traffic signal; debris or trash; weeds or overgrown vegetation; animal issue; code enforcement; water issue; or other.

The app uses the phone's GIS information to record the location of the service request. Photos of the area can be attached to the service request. Once an issue is reported through the app, City staff will track it and send status reports to the resident. For more information, call the City's Public Works Department at (562) 916-1220.

**Cerritos Library To Go:** This app offers access to the eCatalog, event calendar and the library's You-Tube videos. The app's BookLook Mobile™ feature allows users to scan or enter a book's ISBN barcode data to see if the book is in the library's collection. With the app's Smart Prefix<sup>TM</sup> search, parts of words (such as "har pot ch" when looking for "Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets") can be entered to easily search the eCatalog.

Cerritos Library cardholders can access their accounts and some of the library's research databases, download eBooks and eAudio Books and place books on hold through the app. To download the app, visit the iTunes App Store, Android Market/Google Play or the Windows Store.
