

Mark the City's 68th anniversary at the Spring Fling

Cerritos' annual Spring Fling & Fireworks Spectacular on Saturday, April 27 celebrates the City's 68th anniversary. Admission is free to the event, which runs from 4 to 8:30 p.m. at the Cerritos Sports Complex. A dance recital, local talent and professional acts will be featured, along with gourmet food trucks. A fireworks display will be presented at 8:30 p.m.

Cerritos was incorporated on April 24, 1956 as the City of Dairy Valley, reflecting the agricultural focus of the community. The cows outnumbered the City's 3,439 residents by nine to one. The City voted on February 17, 1959 to become a California chartered city and the name change to Cerritos was made official

Cerritos Library and Recreation Services Division seek volunteers

The Recreation Services Division's volunteer program also offers ample opportunities for adults and teens, age 13 and older, who would like to serve their community.

The Application/Waiver is available online in the Recreation section of the City's website at cerritos.us or at any Cerritos community center. Volunteers younger than 18 must obtain approval from their parent or guardian. on January 10, 1967. By 1972, Cerritos was the fastest growing city in California.

In 2008, Cerritos received the nation's oldest and most prestigious award, being named an All-America City by the National Civic League. Today the City is thriving as a home to the Cerritos Auto Square, which generates millions of dollars in sales tax revenue annually; the world-class Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts; and the award-winning Cerritos Library. - Continued the local emergency concerning a gasoline leak from a privately owned existing pipeline on the Cerritos Iron-Wood Nine Golf Course as proclaimed in Resolution No. 2023-05, at the Cerritos Iron-Wood Nine Golf Course and the nearby City property within the C-4 well site; and
- Made the findings set forth in Sections 1 through 8 of Resolution No. 2023-05, and incorporated by reference those findings, as they relate to the continued existence of a local emergency as specified; and
- Directed staff to provide a report to the City Council regarding the local emergency at least once every 60 days, pursuant to Section 8630(c) of the California Government Code, until the City Council terminates the local emergency.
- Awarded a contract to Hartzog & Crabill, Inc. for annual traffic engineering services in the City of Cerritos, RFP No. 1525-23 for a 12-month term, with provisions for four 12-month extensions, and rejected the other proposals.
- Awarded a contract to Willdan Engineering for annual civil engineering services in the City of Cerritos, RFP No. 1526-23, for a 12-month term, with provisions for four 12-month extensions, and rejected the other proposals.
- Adopted Resolution No. 2024-05, a resolution of the City Council of the City of Cerritos accepting an easement deed for public utility purposes from

CBG Investment Property and Ronald W. Gregoire Family Trust, owners of the property located at 11011 South Street, Cerritos, CA 90703 (APN 7038-013-018); and

- Authorized the City Clerk to record the easement documents.
- Directed staff to work with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) to determine an alternative or best use of a \$4.4 million grant that was previously awarded to the City for the purchase of zero emission transit buses in support of fixed-route transit operations, including the purchase of "green" vehicles and/or use in support of a micro-transit service, and provide an update to the City Council accordingly;
- Directed staff to establish parameters for amending the existing Cerritos on Wheels (COW) fixed-route service, in pursuit of a micro-transit demand-response COW service available to the general public, and maintain a separate demandresponse Dial-A-Ride service for transportation of Cerritos seniors and persons with disabilities; and
- Directed staff to solicit proposals for contract services for the implementation of a micro-transit demand-response COW service available to the general public City-wide with access to the Metro Green "C" Line and Metrolink stations in the city of Norwalk, as well as a separate micro-transit demand-response Dial-A-Ride service for Cerritos seniors and persons with disabilities.

Beginning in April 2024, Cerritos Library patrons will be able to check out seeds from our new Seed Library. The Seed Library will allow patrons to check out seeds for native California plants such as wildflowers, sunflowers and a pollinator mix of flowers. A variety of vegetable, fruit and herb seeds will also be available. We hope that this seed library will support community member's efforts to live healthier, sustainable lifestyles.

Seed Library Use

Seeds can be acquired by visiting the Library during regular business hours. The Seed Library is located near the Circulation Desk.

Patrons may checkout up to four seed packets per month. Patrons may keep the seeds and packets and do not have to return any items to the Library. Seeds can be checked out by any patron age 13 or older.

Promote safety with nightly routine

In an effort to curb residential burglaries, the Cerritos Community Safety Division and the Cerritos Sheriff's Station recommends the 9 p.m. routine.

- The routine urges residents to:
- Remove valuables from cars
- Lock your doors (the house and your cars)
- Bring in your mail
- Turn on outdoor lights
- Activate alarms

Other ways to fight crime include leaving a radio on during the day and lights on at night; posting "Beware of Dog" signs; making sure shrubs don't obscure doors and windows; and not posting vacation photos on social media when traveling. Investing in an alarm and camera system and installing shatterresistant security film on first-floor windows and doors also help to deter criminals. Residents are highly encouraged to join the Neighborhood Watch in Cerritos, a joint effort by community members and the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety Center to fight crime and protect property. One of the oldest crime-prevention programs, it serves as the eyes and ears of the Sheriff's Department and has proven instrumental in keeping communities safe.

Metro plans improvements to 605 Freeway at South Street

As part of the I-605 Hot Spots Program, the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) hopes to ease congestion with planned improvements to the southbound I-605 Freeway at the South Street off-ramp.

The project calls for adding an additional exit lane from I-605 to the South Street off-ramp. This will result in a standard deceleration distance for motorists exiting the freeway. By reconfiguring the South Street southbound off-ramp, the project will help ease gridlock, enhance mobility and improve public safety and regional traffic flow. The one-year construction project will cost approximately \$33 million and the traffic signal improvements are fully funded by Metro. Be cautious of coyotes in Cerritos

Residents are advised to take the following precautions to avoid encounters with coyotes:

- Feed pets indoors.
- Eliminate potential food and water sources, such as fallen fruit or standing water.
- Keep yards free of thick brush and weeds.
- Enclose the bottoms of porches and decks.
- Keep dogs on a leash at all times when outdoors.
- Keep small animals inside or supervised when outdoors. A fenced yard will not protect small animals because coyotes can easily scale residential fences. Domestic dogs are especially vulnerable to covote

attacks. Adult coyotes are mainly active at night or in the early morning hours, while young coyotes are often active during the day. California coyotes have adapted to residential neighborhoods, parks and open spaces in urban and suburban areas. They are especially prevalent in areas bordering a flood channel.

Residents who see a coyote in their neighborhood should try to scare it away by shouting, throwing rocks, blowing portable air horns or acting in other aggressive ways in order to reinforce the coyote's fear of people. Motion-sensitive lights on houses or outbuildings may also deter coyotes from approaching.

If an aggressive or fearless coyote approaches you or your pet, consider the following tips:

- Shout in a deep voice.
- Wave your arms.
- Throw objects at the animal.
- Look the coyote directly in the eyes.
- Stand up if you are seated.
- If you are wearing a coat or vest, spread it open like a cape so that you appear larger.
- Retreat from the situation by walking backward slowly. Do not turn your back on the coyote.

The City of Cerritos contracts with Long Beach Animal Care Services to provide a wide range of services, including coyote management. The City of Long Beach has a comprehensive coyote management plan and that plan serves as the de facto plan for Cerritos by extension of the service contract. The majority of cities in the region all have similar coyote management plans as each plan must be in accord with the regulations established by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife.
