Cerritos City Council reorganizes

Grace Hu was selected as mayor of Cerritos and Mark Pulido as mayor pro tem by their colleagues during the City Council's annual reorganization meeting and mayoral transition on April 26.

A Cerritos resident for more than 40 years, Mayor Hu was first elected to the Cerritos City Council in 1992, was mayor from 1995 to 1996 and was re-elected to the City Council in 1997. She served a second term as mayor from 1999 to 2000. Hu was previously on the City's Property Preservation Commission from 1991 to 1992. During her time on the City Council, Hu served on the City's Budget, County Health Department & Health Insurance, Finance, Legal Services, Legislative and Performing Arts committees. She was also the City's alternate delegate to the Gateway Cities Council of Governments and the Council's liaison to Cerritos Community College.

Hu is a real estate broker and investment consultant. She has a graduate degree in business administration from the University of San Francisco and a bachelor of law degree from Catholic Fu-Jen University in Taiwan.

Mayor Pro Tem Mark E. Pulido was elected to the Cerritos City Council in March 2011. He served as Mayor Pro Tem from 2013 to 2014, as Mayor in 2014 and was re-elected to the City Council in 2015. A Cerritos resident since 1972, Mayor Pro Tem Pulido is a Council liaison to the ABC Unified School District and the liaison to Cerritos Community College. He serves on the City's Performing Arts and Library committees. Mayor Pro Tem Pulido is the Council's delegate to the Gateway Cities Council of Governments – 91/605/405 Corridor Cities Committee and an alternate delegate to the League of California Cities, Sanitation Districts 2, 3, 18 & 19/Waste Management and the SELACO Workforce Development Board – Policy Board.

Mayor Pro Tem Pulido is the District Director for Congressman Alan Lowenthal. He graduated from Whitney High School and received his bachelor's degree in History and Asian American Studies from the University of California, Los Angeles. He received his Master of Public Policy degree from The University of Chicago.

Councilmember Jim Edwards was elected to the Cerritos City Council in 2005, was re-elected in 2009,

and served as Mayor of Cerritos from 2008 to 2009.

He was re-elected to the City Council again in 2015. A Cerritos resident for more than 35 years, Councilmember Edwards previously served as a Cerritos Parks and Recreation Commissioner from 1988 to 1997 and 2003 to 2005, and as a Cerritos Community Safety Committee Member from 1997 to 2003. He served on the Board of Directors of the Friends of Arts Education at the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts in 2013 and 2014, including a term as president.

Councilmember Edwards received his Bachelor of Arts degree in physical education from Whittier College, where he also was awarded a Standard Secondary Teaching Credential. He received a master's degree in Educational Technology from National University. He is retired from a career as a teacher and administrator in the ABC Unified School District.

Councilmember Naresh Solanki was elected to the Cerritos City Council in 2015. He became Mayor Pro Tem in 2016. A Cerritos resident since 1988, Councilmember Solanki previously served as a Cerritos Planning Commissioner from 2007 to 2015. Councilmember Solanki owns and is the CEO/President of a chain of retail grocery supermarkets located throughout Southern California.

Councilmember Frank Aurelio Yokoyama was elected to the Cerritos City Council in 2017. A Cerritos resident since 1976, he previously served on the Cerritos Planning Commission from 2011 to 2013. Yokoyama is a local businessman, attorney and a youth sports coach. He graduated from UC Berkeley Business School and Harvard Law School.

Outgoing Mayor George Ray was honored at the meeting for his contributions to the community during his term. Ray was elected to the Cerritos City Council in 2013.

Outgoing Councilmember Carol Chen also was honored at the meeting for her years of service to the City during her term. Elected to the Cerritos City Council in June 2008, Chen served as Mayor from 2011 to 2012 and 2015 to 2016.

Cerritos Water Quality Report available

The City's Annual Consumer Confidence (Water Quality) Report is available on the City's website at cerritos.us/ccr2016.pdf.

State and federal laws require printed or electronic distribution of the water-quality information to everyone served by the City's water utility. The report describes the City's stringent water tests, which are conducted more frequently than required by the State Health Department. The Consumer Confidence Report provides detailed test results and explains the City's water supply, which flows to customers through a system of wells, reservoirs, mains and pipes.

Landlords, employers and school administrators are encouraged to share the water-quality report with their tenants, employees and students. Copies of the report are available at the water billing counter on City Hall's second floor. For more information, call the Water Division at (562) 916-1223. ■

Local students win scholarships from Distinguished Young Women of Cerritos-Artesia

High school students from local schools were recently awarded scholarships at the Distinguished Young Women (DYW) of Cerritos-Artesia event held at Whitney High School's Grace Hu Auditorium.

Twenty-three high school juniors from Artesia, Cerritos, Gahr and Whitney high schools competed for scholarships in five categories: talent, self-expression, scholastics, fitness and interview. The DYW committee awarded \$9,500 in scholarships and more than \$10,000 in products and services to participants.

Gahr High School student Anna Park was named the 2018 Distinguished Young Woman of Cerritos-Artesia WEST and awarded \$1,950. Cerritos High School student Umeesha Dalwis was chosen as the 2018 Distinguished Young Woman of Cerritos-Artesia EAST and awarded \$1,950. The 2018 Alternate DYW of Cerritos-Artesia is Whitney High student Michelle Hyun, who received \$1,400.

Parks and Dalwis will participate in the California State Program to be held in Bakersfield in July.

Other winners include Whitney High School student Anjali Gandhi, who was awarded \$750 in the Talent category. Cerritos High student Lauren Waites won \$975 for the Interview category. The winner of the Scholastics category's \$975 prize is Patricia Ku from Cerritos High School. Fellow Cerritos High student Alina Das received \$550 in the Fitness category.

Park won the Self-Expression category's \$550 prize. Hyun, named The Spirit of DYW winner, received \$450.

Founded in 1958 in Mobile, Alabama, DYW is the largest and oldest national scholarship program for high school girls. During nearly 60 years of operation, the program has provided life-changing experiences for more than 745,000 young women.

Scholarship amounts have steadily increased with support from the City of Cerritos, Soroptimist International of Artesia-Cerritos, Woman's Club of Artesia-Cerritos and M.S. International, Inc.

Field studies and surveys scheduled for 91 Freeway project

Field studies and surveys will be conducted in Cerritos, Artesia, Norwalk and unincorporated Los Angeles County throughout the year as part of a project to improve and widen the westbound State Route 91 (SR-91).

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) and the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) District 7 will conduct the field studies and surveys in the public right-of-way and in private properties (with proper advanced notification and permission to enter). Field studies and surveys may include surveys for noise monitoring, biological resources, cultural/historic resources, paleontological resources and field topographic surveys. The field surveys will occur during daytime hours Monday through Friday.

The freeway project aims to improve operations along westbound SR-91, between Shoemaker Avenue and the Interstate 605 interchange and at the I-605 northbound off-ramp to Alondra Boulevard. The project includes improvements to freeway entrance and exit ramps and operational improvements for the northbound I-605 at the Alondra Boulevard off-ramp. Additional improvements are also anticipated on the arterial streets in the vicinity of the freeway ramp intersections.

City approves CalMet waste management contract

The City Council recently voted to extend Cerritos' contract with CalMet Services, Inc. for solid waste management through December 31, 2027.

Under the agreement, CalMet will introduce new changes, including free residential battery curbside collection and bus-stop trash service at the City-owned transit amenities. An organics recycling program will also be implemented.

Residential rates for trash collection will remain the same until July 2018. CalMet will also assume street-sweeping services in 2018 at no charge to the City. This saves the City of Cerritos approximately \$470,000 for the 2017-2018 fiscal year. ■

CCPA maintenance contracts awarded

The Cerritos City Council recently awarded maintenance contracts for the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts (CCPA).

Petra CPS of Placentia was awarded \$177,785 to resurface the floors. The project includes resurfacing the main stage, the main theater floor and seating storage areas. The project also includes repairing the seismic anchors for the storage of the theater's movable towers and relocating the anchors to maximize the main stage's usability.

Black Sheep Enterprises was awarded a \$61,029 contract to replace the CCPA's original red box curtains and acoustical banners, which were installed in 1992.

Both projects will be completed in June. ■

Rabies clinics to be held in June and July

The City of Cerritos will hold two low-cost rabies clinics for dogs and cats in Shelter 1 at Cerritos Park East from 6:30 to 8 p.m. on Tuesday, June 20 and Wednesday, July 19.

The clinics are sponsored by Long Beach Animal Care Services and Artesia Animal Hospital, in cooperation with the City of Cerritos' Community Safety and Community Participation divisions.

Rabies shots for dogs and cats will be available for \$10, and canine bordetella (kennel cough) shots cost \$17 each. Canine coronavirus vaccines are \$15, and Lyme disease vaccines will be \$23. DHPP shots, also known as the "6-in-1" vaccine that protects dogs from distemper, hepatitis, parainfluenza and parvovirus, will be available for \$19. The comparable "4-in-1" (FVRCP) shot for cats cost \$18. Feline bordetella (FIP) shots will

Updated fee schedule approved

The Cerritos City Council recently approved raising existing fees and implementing new fee types related to planning, development and public works. The increases, scheduled to be implemented on July 1, are the first hikes since the fee schedule was established in 1973. The City Council also approved adopting new City fees associated with Los Angeles County building permit issuance.

The City's fees are currently among the lowest in the region and lower than the average fee assessed by other cities for each fee type surveyed. The outdated fees do not cover administrative processing and review costs. Some

of the fees affected include development plan approvals, conditional use permits and temporary use permits. City residents will receive a 20 percent discount for City fees related to residential project permits.

By increasing and introducing new fees to the existing fee structure, the City expects to generate about \$900,000 annually to offset administration costs. Even with the fee schedule changes, the City's fees are lower than or comparable to other Los Angeles County cities.

be \$29, and feline coronavirus (FELV) shots are \$20. In addition to vaccination fees, a \$3 biohazard disposal fee will be charged for each treated animal.

Checks for vaccines should be made payable to the City of Cerritos. A driver's license number and expiration date are required on all checks. Returned checks are subject to a \$10 service fee. AVID microchipping will also be available for \$25 per cat or dog.

In addition to an annual rabies shot, dogs four months and older are required by law to have a license. Dog licenses will be sold to Cerritos, Long Beach, Los Alamitos, Seal Beach and Signal Hill residents at the clinics. Dog license fees for Cerritos residents are \$20, or \$10 for dogs that are spayed or neutered (a certificate is required to receive the discount). Seniors ages 60 and older may purchase up to three half-price licenses per household for dogs that are spayed or neutered. To obtain a license, dog owners must show a copy of a current rabies certificate, valid for 12 months, and a sterility certificate if the dog is spayed or neutered. Checks for dog licenses should be made payable to Long Beach Animal Care Services.

Pet owners must keep their dogs on leashes and cats in pet carriers during the clinics. For more information about animal licenses, call Long Beach Animal Care Services at (562) 570-7387. ■

Prevent West Nile virus

West Nile virus is a mosquito-transmitted disease that can cause debilitating illness and death to humans as well as birds, horses and other wildlife.

Twenty percent of infected people will exhibit flu-like symptoms, and one in 150 people infected will require hospitalization. There is currently no cure or vaccine for the virus.

The Greater Los Angeles Vector Control District (GLACVCD), a local government and public health agency dedicated to reducing populations of public health vectors and preventing human infection associated with mosquito-transmitted diseases, has issued the following tips to stay safe.

- Eliminate standing water around the home. It takes as little as five days for mosquito eggs to hatch into biting adults.
- Many children play sports or are outdoors from late afternoon to the evening hours, when mosquitoes are most active. Anyone outside during these hours should wear long-sleeved shirts and pants and use insect repellent containing DEET, Picaridin and oil of lemon eucalyptus.
- To help West Nile Virus surveillance and control efforts, report dead birds at westnile.ca.gov.
